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TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the period ended 31 December 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

The general functions of the PCC are stated within Section 2 of the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956.

The JC Lytham Mission Statement is currently "Two Homes, One Family".

When planning our activities for the year, the PCC gave consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, and in particular, the specific guidance to charities concerned with the advancement of religion.

Achievements and performance

2022 brought the two parishes of St John the Divine, Lytham and St Cuthbert, Lytham together as the Parish of St John the Divine and St Cuthbert, Lytham to be commonly known as JC Lytham. This followed two years of negotiation and planning. Although a similar plan existed around two decades ago, the effect of working closely during the early months of the Coronavirus Pandemic and the retirement of Revd Ann Wood, House for Duty Priest in Charge of St John's, focused minds. It became clear to both PCCs and the vicar of St Cuthbert's that this was a move God was calling us to make. That it was carried unanimously at the 2021 APCMs in both Parishes providing the foundation to seek the change from the Bishop of Blackburn.

The new parish formally came into being on 21 March 2022 and we celebrated this at Pentecost as we shared a service together including walking from St. John's to St Cuthbert's. We further celebrated the new parish on 16 August when the Bishop of Burnley joined us to license the Revd Emma Swarbrick as our Mission Enabler, community leaders were also invited and there was a wonderful atmosphere that evening.

Since the beginning of the talks there has been a temporary pattern to Sunday Services and as 2022 concluded a revised pattern was agreed. Moving from having Holy Communion every week to 3 or 4 times a month has been quite a shift and it is clear some people have been less than keen. However the other week provides us with a chance to include more teaching in the sermon, or preach in a more all age way. We must record our appreciation of the ministry of our LLMs who have ensured services and sermons have all been covered to a high standard.

Early in the year we reduced and then ceased livestreaming services as it became clear there was little take up for this beyond lockdown. The sharing of Daily Prayer on Facebook also came to an end in the autumn as the pattern of parish life began to become re-established.

Numbers attending services has, as yet, not recovered from the effects of the pandemic. It is clear that many of the congregation prior to 2020 at both churches are less able to get to church, beside deaths and people moving from the area. However we have welcomed new members and quite a number of them are beginning to take an active part in the life of the parish.

With the new parish came the requirement to cover the necessary roles for the parish and we are so grateful to everyone who has stepped forward and would also like to extend our thanks for those who had fulfilled these roles in the former parishes.

January 2022 saw the arrival of Mrs Amanda Wooldridge as the new Head of our Lytham CofE Primary School. The parish and especially the clergy have been supporting her and the school and we continue to have a strong working relationship together.

In the spring, Bob Briscoe offered his services as our Health and Safety Adviser, an area he is well qualified in and during the year he has worked diligently to make sure our H&S policies were updated. This has been no small task and we are indebted to him for this.

During the year we have been able to redecorate the Vestry at St John's thanks to the work of a number of parishioners. The kitchen at St Cuthbert's has been refitted and is much more serviceable again. We are grateful for the time of parishioners and their generosity in raising funds to complete this work.

As Emma settled in with us during the autumn, we have recommenced home study discipleship group and are planning to run Alpha in early 2023. The former vicarage for St John's was sold off and a replacement house purchased on Victory Boulevard. This was completed by the Blackburn Diocesan Clergy Housing Department. The new house is a big improvement on its predecessor.

Financially it has been a tough year and this is laid out further in the report. Suffice to say the regular giving to the ministry of the parish and income from other sources has been severely affected by Covid19 and we have had to draw heavily on our reserves to continue.

Financial review

Net incoming resources for the period amounted to £203,369, which included funds donated from the merger of the two original parishes amounting to £240,597. There was a net deficit for the year of £37,228 excluding these donations. Unrestricted funds amounted to £97,288, restricted funds of £63,272 and endowment funds of £42,809.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the period.

The PCC carried out risk assessments throughout the year to identify any major risks.

Financial Risk

Investments held by the PCC are reviewed in accordance with Diocesan guidelines. The PCC approves internal controls for annual accounts and cheque handling.

Compliance with Law and Regulation

The PC is informed of risks and these are dealt with as appropriate. Procedures for reporting accidents are in place. The fire extinguishers and security alarm are checked regularly in compliance with our H & S policy and procedures.; A risk management survey was carried out by insurers and acted upon.

Safeguarding

The Church has adopted the Blackburn Diocesan 'Protection for All' policy on Safeguarding Children & Vulnerable Adults. JC Lytham complies with DBS requirements when recruiting volunteers and staff.

Plans for future periods

Our aims for 2023

- ensure we are an inviting and welcoming church through our ministry to visitors and new people and caring for the congregation:
- we continue to be committed to growing disciples through study groups including Alpha;
- assist Lytham Church of England School in creating a vision for the school and continuing to offer support and encouragement to children, staff and parents;
- grow our ministry to children and young people;
- to run a Stewardship Campaign and encourage people to join the Parish Giving Scheme;
- to explore ways of improving the level of giving to the church and support those responsible for the oversight of our finances;
- to seek fresh ways of fundraising and encouraging the community to realise that our church buildings are their churches;
- establish a new Pastoral Care team and thereby offer greater pastoral support to the people of the parish;
- both churches are due their Quinquennial Inspections so we need to prepare ourselves for further maintenance issues being highlighted.

Structure, governance and management

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of St John the Divine and St Cuthbert, Lytham is a charity registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales. St John the Divine Church is located on East Beach, Lytham and St Cuthbert's Church is located on Church Road, Lytham. The parish is part of the Deanery of Kirkham.

The new parish was formed on 21 March 2022 and the first Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held on 18 May 2022 when members of the Parochial Church Council were elected. During the intervening time those elected to the PCCs of the individual parishes served as the interim PCC.

St John the Divine and St Cuthbert Lytham PCC is a body corporate and operates under the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 and the Church Representation Rules.

PCC members are appointed as set out in the Church Representation Rules. All church members are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

The Churches in Lytham have a long established partnership to which the parish is a fully committed partner. The Vicar, Mission Enabler and two church members elected by the PCC, serve on the LEP Council, and in 2022 they were lan Birnie and Bev Wells.

L:ytham Schools Foundation

The Vicar is the nominated representative from St Cuthbert's on the Foundation.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of St John the Divine & St Cuthbert Lytham is a body corporate and operates under the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 and the Church Representation Rules.

1.1 Reporting period

The accounts are presented for the period from 12 July 2022, the date of registration, to 31 December 2022, which is the date required by the Diocese.

1.2 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.3 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.4 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

1.5 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

1 Accounting policies

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1.6 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.7 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Plant and equipment 25% on reducing balance Fixtures and fittings 20% on reducing balance

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.8 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.10 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.11 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
