On Saturday October 7<sup>th</sup> members of our PCC, LLMs and ALMs gathered at Whalley Abbey to spend a day together thinking and reflecting on our parish. Now we are settled into '2 Homes 1 Family' we began to think of our strengths and weaknesses as a parish and discern what our priorities should be over the next twelve months, three years and five years.



The image the leader of the day, the Revd Fleur Green, gave us was to view our parish as a tree, prompting questions:

- how deep are our roots;
- are we healthy, do we bear good fruit;
- are we good for our environment;
- does anything require pruning;
- are we producing new saplings.

Overall it was thought we were doing OK in all these areas. Our main challenges concern growth, impacting our environment and producing new saplings whilst our greatest strengths are that we have deep roots and bear some good fruit.

We further reflected on where the gaps are in our mission as a parish and what were the headline issues we needed to put energy into.

The PCC is now beginning to discuss the issues and ideas raised to prioritise were we need to particularly focus and they have already resolved to include a summary of each PCC meeting in the Magazine so everyone is more aware of what is happening and what is being discussed and considered. If you have any thoughts which may assist the PCC discussions and future planning please do speak to one of the members.

And one thing Fleur underlined was that this exercise is not about creating jobs the clergy have to add to our to do list, but that they are areas everyone should be involved in progressing.

#### Jacqui Briscoe - Licensed Lay Minister (LLM)



Nick was pleased to welcome Jacqui to the Ministry Team back in May when she was relicensed as an LLM to our Parish. She was first licensed as a Reader, as they were known then, in 2006 in Middlewich. Jacqui held many volunteer roles whilst in the Chester Diocese including Chaplaincy supporting the farming community, in nursing homes and a sheltered housing complex. She took many funerals over that period; and also led Alpha Courses for 14 years leading and supporting many people to come to Christ.

Jacqui was sent to Sunday School as a youngster, not particularly engaging with the Christian message but loved the singing and so rather than feeling forced to attend, quite enjoyed it. There was a big gap between Sunday School and when eventually Jacqui gave her life to Jesus at the age of 30 in the local Pentecostal Church, where she worshiped for 10 years and thought that was going to be her church forever. Sadly, the Pastor moved on and without a leader the church declined, which meant Jacqui and Rob, her husband, moved to the Anglican Church in Hartford. At St Johns there was an active Men's Fellowship which Rob got involved in and they were greatly encouraged and felt at home there.

Their move to Lytham sort of just happened. There was no great plan to move to the area. They had lived in their previous home for over 38 years, but things were changing in their area and so two years ago, they put their house up for sale. A friend asked where they were moving to, to which they replied, 'we don't know'. The friend mentioned that he had some friends who had just moved to Lytham and they loved it. Jacqui and Rob came to visit and fell in love with the area. They started looking for a house, and where they are now in Shepherd Road just felt so right. They really believed God was leading them in their decision to move here.

They started attending St Cuthberts 18 months ago; Jacqui led our Bible Study on Philippians and is now leading our Discipleship Course. She is a great asset to the Team and we look forward to her sharing her gifts, knowledge and experience with us all. Jacqui loves to chat and will talk to anyone and is very welcoming to anyone new who happens to come through our church doors.

Its great to have you on board Jacqui and Rob. Thank you for coming to Lytham.

#### Christmas Through The Keyhole

A new and exciting venture is coming to JC Lytham! On 7-9<sup>th</sup> December,



we will be holding a Christmas trail in St John's Church. Christmas Through the Keyhole is a multi-sensory trail for all ages that leads groups of children and adults on a journey around the church, through 'rooms' of characters from the nativity story, each time looking through the keyhole to ask, "Who would live in a place like this?"

Participants will visit Mary's house, the Shepherds' field, the Wise Men's tent, and Joseph's workshop, before setting out on a journey to find the baby Jesus.

On Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> and Friday 8<sup>th</sup> December, groups from Lytham C of E and Hall Park (with a drop-in from Bishop Philip) will join us during the day to embark on their journey.

On Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> December, the trail will be open for anyone in the community to come and join in. The regular coffee morning will look a little different that day. There will still be refreshments available, but there will also be the opportunity to join in with the trail, to engage in Christmas themed crafts, and to see how we as a church are engaging with the children and families of Lytham. Please do come along and support it.

We need to furnish these rooms to make them look as authentic as possible. At the back of both churches there are photographs of these spaces as they have been set up in other churches and a list of possible items that we need to source to furnish them. #### Message from the Bishop of Balckburn

Diocesan Synod heard a powerful Presidential Address from Bishop Philip last weekend, with the theme of reconciliation, in which he dared us all to pray for five years of consecutive growth as a Diocese.

Before a busy Synod agenda got under way, Bishop Philip said: "We are part of a Diocese that is showing a level of missional and



strategic coherence that is likely soon to attract tens of millions of pounds of investment from the national church.

"We have a Parish renewal programme that is turning round ministries and bringing people to faith. We have a team of clergy and lay leaders who almost all share a desire to grow their congregations, not because they want to keep an institution alive but because their own faith in Jesus means that genuinely long for others to have the same and we have remarkable ministry in our schools and chaplaincies.

He continued: "Our greatest shared fear must surely be that our missional coherence is undermined by what is happening in the church nationally.

"So, in the midst of all that, let's hold up the cross. Let us commit ourselves anew to holding up the cross as we proclaim the Gospel, serve the poor, live lives of self-giving love and offer the world the sacraments of the Church.

Warming to his theme, Bishop Philip added: "This is the dare. What if we did this: The latest data is that between 2021 and 2022 the regularly weekly attendance in churches across the Diocese grew, even though very few of you were as yet including new local congregations in the data. That growth came from churches of every tradition.

"What if we committed ourselves to praying for five years of consecutive growth as a Diocese?

"Bishop Jill has coined the phrase, 'mutual missioning'; that's the desire to work in harmony for the sake of the mission of the Church.

"In the midst of national storms, may we dare to go on ministering and declaring the cross together in the Spirit's power for the benefit of the people of Lancashire."

#### The Cenotaph

November is the month when we particularly remember the dead of both world wars and later conflicts. Remembrance Day is 11 November because it was at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month that the guns fell silent and all fighting ceased at the end of World War I — the Great War, as it was known in the years before World War II. Strictly speaking, 11 November 1918 was an Armistice: legally, the end of the war did not come until 1919 with the Treaty of Versailles. So, some memorials give the dates of the war as 1914-19, although it is more usual simply to count the years of fighting, 1914-18.

There was a great parade in London in 1919 to mark the end of the war, and as part of the ceremonial the 15,000 troops marched past and saluted a tall wooden structure that had been erected in the middle of Whitehall: the forerunner of the present Cenotaph. Its austere design, by the distinguished architect Sir Edward Lutyens, depicted a tombchest resting on top of a rectangular pylon - a tall supportive structure diminishing as it rises, an architectural echo of the structure marking the gateway of an Egyptian temple. It was originally conceived as a temporary structure just for the ceremony. But its simplicity and dignity caught the mood of the moment: more than a million people visited the site within a week of the parade, and there was almost immediately a demand for it to be rebuilt in permanent form. Action guickly followed: Lutyens made hardly any changes, apart from adding a degree of curvature (entasis), and the erection of the Cenotaph as we know it, built of Portland stone, began in May 1920. It was unveiled by King George V on 11 November 1920, in a ceremony that was combined with the repatriation from the Western Front of the body of the Unknown Soldier, to be laid in honour in Westminster Abbey.

The word Cenotaph comes from the Greek and means 'empty tomb'. As a war memorial, it symbolises the absence of those who were killed, since most of the dead were buried close to where they fell, identified or unidentified, or were in some cases never recovered at all. Because, in its form, it is a cenotaph, an empty tomb, rather than some more usual memorial monument, it speaks of the individual loss even at the same time as its grandeur, austerity and location make it national. It was rededicated in 1946 to include the dead of the Second World War, and since then it has also come to memorialise the British dead of later conflicts, although, of course, when it was first erected, it commemorated the dead not just of Britain, but of the whole of the Empire, then at its peak. On each of the narrower sides, on the second tier below the tomb-chest, there is a laurel wreath. These echo the wreath, which we cannot see, on top of the tomb-chest. The only inscriptions are 'The Glorious Dead' and, in Roman numerals, the dates of the two World Wars, WW I above the wreath and WW II on the sides. On one long side the flags are the RAF Ensign, Union Flag and Red Ensign, and on the other the Blue Ensign, Union Flag and White Ensign. The absence of any Christian symbolism on the monument was criticised by some at the time, but it is the simple universality that gives the Cenotaph its power. Joyce Hill

This small hidden gem prompted me to choose **Bible Locations** as this month's subject. 
