#### Dear Friends

One of the issues I have wrestled with since coming to Lytham nearly eight years ago is how to enable the church to be more inclusive and involved in the town.

Reading old articles about the building of, say, the Lytham Institute, it is clear the



clergy and church had quite an influence. Of course the church was much more central in wider culture and society in those days.

I could come up with a number of theories for this, most on the basis that somewhere along the line the Church has lost the respect of many and is not considered relevant in today's world.

One of the many reasons I was keen to see the parishes of St Cuthbert Lytham and St John the Divine Lytham unite was so the new parish would cover the whole town without a geographical divide. For decades the parish boundaries went through the centre of Lytham from Clifton Square (the Piazza) to the bridge by the railway station. In other words through the heart of the town.

The church involvement in community events, including Club Day is important, with Julie Smith, one of our Sunday School Leaders, representing us on the Club Day Committee, indeed we have provided two of the Rose Queens either side of the Covid pandemic. The PCC is also supportive of the Lytham Voice initiative especially the potential creation of a Lytham Town Council. Information about Lytham Voice can be viewed at <u>www.lythamvoice.co.uk</u> I was delighted that we were invited to take part in the recent switching on of the Christmas Lights, joining the torchlight procession and being invited to bless the event.

Christmas has changed much in my lifetime. The centrality of the birth of Jesus has been pushed into the background in the same way that our churches have been moved to the fringes of the town.

Having been missed off the list of invitations for a few years, I am excited that the churches in Lytham are once again being invited and encouraged to be part of the Christmas Lights switch on, it is so encouraging.

The challenge for us as a church is growing these opportunities so that the community gets to know that our churches are 'Good News' and also to bring Christ to greater recognition in the Christmas season.

#### Christmas Through the Keyhole



Plans are now well advanced for our Christmas Through the Keyhole event – 7th to 9<sup>th</sup> December. This is a Christmas trail that we are hosting in St John's Church.

Christmas Through the Keyhole is a multisensory trail for all ages that leads groups of children and adults on a journey around the church, through 'rooms' of characters from

the nativity story, each time looking through the keyhole to ask, "Who would live in a place like this?" Participants will visit Mary's house, the Shepherds' field, the Wise Men's tent, and Joseph's workshop, before setting out on a journey to find the baby Jesus.

On Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> and Friday 8<sup>th</sup> December, groups from Lytham C of E and Hall Park (with a drop-in from Bishop Philip) will join us during the day to embark on their journey.

On Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> December, the trail will be open for anyone in the community to come and join in. The regular coffee morning will look a little different that day. There will still be refreshments available, but there will also be the opportunity to join in with the trail, to engage in

Christmas themed crafts, and to see how we as a church are engaging with the children and families of Lytham. Please do come along and support it.

Before then, WE NEED YOUR HELP!

We need to furnish these rooms to make them look as authentic as possible. At the back of both churches there are photographs of these spaces as they have been set up in other churches and a list of possible items that we need to source to furnish them. #### Christingle

The Christingle Service this year is on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> December at 6pm at St John's.

Christingle celebrations have been taking place for over 50 years. The first Christingle service supporting the work of the Children's Society took place at Lincoln Cathedral in 1968, but Christingles themselves go back much further to the Moravian church in Germany.



At a children's service in Marienborn in 1747,

Bishop Johannes de Watteville looked for a simple way to explain the happiness that had come to people through Jesus, and created a symbol — the Christingle — to do this.

It is a simple service but gives a strong message of how Jesus is the Light of the whole World.

Over the last 50 years, Christingle celebrations have raised millions of pounds to support the life-changing work of The Children's Society with children and young people. The money raised helps to connect them to their services, and rekindle the hope they deserve.

From The Childrens' Society – "The generosity and support shown at Christingle services is overwhelming and every year we are reminded of the compassionate Christinglers that help bring hope to young people across the country".

#### **RNLI Service**

This year's RNLI service will be at St Cuthbert's on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> December at 10:15am. And it will be a joint service.



As well as celebrating and praying for the work of the RNLI we will be marking the anniversary of the Mexico Disaster which has affected our community so deeply ever since.

We will also be commemorating the life of Thomas Henry Rimmer who became Coxswain of the replacement boat after the disaster. His grave has only recently been marked with a memorial stone in St Cuthberts Churchyard and this will be dedicated after the service.

We are also delighted that the Mayor of the Fylde, Cheryl Little has accepted an invitation to join us for the service and will be accompanied by her Consort Paul Little who has strong **connections** with our local RNLI.

#### Resume of the PCC meeting held on 16 October 2023.

Detailed discussions took place following the PCC away day at Whalley Abbe, in particular looking at where the future growth of our Church family would come from, homing in on young adults, Sunday School, Youth Club, and greater integration and participation from our primary school in Lytham. In addition raising awareness of our JC churches throughout the Parish was considered and the concept of "marketing " and consideration of having more social events. The follow up of all matters raised at the Away Day would continue to be considered at future meetings and reported thereon in the Parish Magazine.

Debate also centered on the Parish buildings, in particular the electrical work at St Cuthberts and the damage to the office roof caused by a tree which is the subject of an insurance claim. As regards St Johns, roof tiles are to be replaced and work on three trees is ongoing. The leak in the Church Hall is being addressed with builders quotes received and quotes being sought for scaffolding.

Wi-Fi and mobile hub upgrades are ongoing at both St Cuthberts and St Johns.

Presentations were made on Outreach and Discipleship ,in particular Worship in Wellies, Parenting for Faith, Christmas Through the Keyhole, and the Alpha course. Reference was made to Worship for Everyone and in particular, during November, the substitution of lectionary readings with sermons based on Worship for Everyone.

The Church finances were considered and in particular the progress of the new Stewardship Campaign. It was noted that take up of the new Parish Giving Scheme had been less than expected and letters were to be sent to those parishioners still paying in to the old church accounts, noting that these accounts would be closed by the end of the current financial year, 31 December 2023 and they should be moved to the new scheme with the accompanying direct debit.

A Safeguarding report was considered and it was emphasized that PCC members should complete their basic training modules as soon as practicable.

A school report was presented by the Head Teacher providing an update on matters over the last few months since the new term began. Emphasis was placed on the priority placed on reading skills and the advent of the new Library Bus. Reference was made to the School being awarded a Gold Award for the school gardens at the Lytham in Bloom Presentations. Christian values permeate all that is done at the School.

The Vicar presented his report mentioned that the RNLI service will be held on the 11 December at St Cuthberts and it was agreed that this would be a joint service, with the Mayor of the Fylde being invited. Discussions also took place on the concept of social events held at the vicarage gardens next year and other types of social events.....more on this at other meetings.

#### Marketing Assistance

One area the PCC is keen to develop is the way we market ourselves: our faith and our parish. To help us ensure we are using as many formats as possible to tell people about who we are, what we are doing and what we believe, we are looking for a volunteer to help us.

If you have these skills, or know someone who does, we would love to hear from you please get in touch with Nick or Emma over the next few weeks. At present we promote ourselves through our website <u>www.jclytham.church</u> - Facebook @jclytham - daily emails and weekly ebulletins – the monthly magazine – noticeboards (inside and outside) – verbal notices at each service. We have a YouTube channel and an X account which aren't used at the moment. There is more we could do and all this takes time and we would love for someone who has the time and skills to help with this important task.

#### Parish Giving Scheme

We have now sent letters to our planned givers advising them the old bank accounts for St John and for St Cuthbert are shortly to be closed . We have combined the accounts and opened a new bank account for the new parish.

We encourage everyone to arrange for their giving through the Parish Giving scheme where possible. It will be easier for us to administer and also means we have to handle less cash which can create safety concerns.

#### Ambrose, Bishop of Milan

My article for December usually relates to Christmas in some way. But occasionally I write instead about one of the figures we commemorate in the December liturgical calendar. Some time ago, for example, I wrote on St John the Apostle (27 December); this year, I've decided that it's about time I wrote on St Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, revered in the Middle Ages as one of the four great Doctors of the Church, alongside Augustine, Jerome and Gregory the Great. His feast-day, on 7 December, is not his death-day, as it usually is for saints, but the date of his consecration as Bishop of Milan in 374. He died in office on 4 April 397.

Ambrose was born in the Roman city of Augusta Treverorum (modern Trier), c. 339, into a well-to-do Christian family. The western Roman Empire had not yet begun to break up, and Trier was the capital of one of its provinces. But on the religious front things were changing in a major way. In 312 the Emperor Constantine had issued an edict permitting religious plurality so that Christianity was able to be openly practised and, with the support of the emperor, the church was then quite quickly integrated into Roman society. This eventually led to Theodosius (Emperor 379-95) decreeing that Christianity, as defined in the Nicene Creed, was henceforth the religion of the Empire. This Creed had its beginnings at the Council of Nicaea in 325, called by Constantine to settle various doctrinal matters, chief amongst which was whether Christ was human, divine, or fully both. The Council decided on 'fully both'. The resulting Creed asserted this orthodox belief and attacked Arians, who argued that Christ's nature was human. However, this vigorously polemical Nicene Creed was modified and developed under

Theodosius, and that's the version we use. Ambrose's life spanned this extraordinary period of Christian history.

He was well-educated, as one might expect for someone of his class, receiving, in Rome, a good classical education before embarking on a career in the higher ranks of the imperial public service, following the kind of career his father had had. In 372 he was made Governor of the Province of Liguria and Emilia, with its capital at Mediolanum (modern Milan), where the bishop was an Arian. In 374 this bishop died and the local Arians — still a force to contend with — pressed for an Arian successor. Ambrose, as Governor, went to the church where the election was being held in order to prevent serious trouble, and there the crowd spontaneously acclaimed him bishop. He was already wellknown to be Nicene in his beliefs, but he was not yet baptized or formally trained in theology and felt unworthy, so he fled to a colleague's house and hid. But he accepted after receiving a letter from the Emperor Gratian, and was baptized, ordained and consecrated within a week. This was the first time in the West that a high imperial official had become a bishop.

Ambrose, as bishop, lived a very ascetic life, giving away his money and land. Yet his previous life equipped him to influence people of great standing, including successive emperors. He also fought strongly against Arianism, believing that the Empire needed unity of doctrine. His own writings contributed to the development of theology, which was still very much being debated and shaped at this time, and he was noted as a writer of hymns. He was also a significance influence on Augustine of Hippo, whom he helped to convert to Christianity. *Joyce Hill*
