Dear Friends,

On Sunday 21st January we had the pleasure of joining the congregations from the other Churches in Lytham for our annual Covenant Service at St Peter's RC Church.

I must say I was heartened by the number of you from JC Lytham who were



able to attend. The Covenant, forty years old this year, is one of the oldest in the North West of England and almost seems to be part of our DNA locally, thanks to the passion and work of the late Ian Birnie who represented St Cuthberts from the very start.

The service reminded me of being in the youth group at Wrea Green. The group met on a Sunday evening and for some time was led by my dad, the Vicar of Wrea Green and Father Wells the Roman Catholic Priest at St Anne Westby. The two clergy, with the same surname and both originating from Aston on Ribble got on well, and the young people of each church mixed, studied and prayed together easily. Eventually I took on the leadership of the group and it is heartening to find one of them is now the organist at St Peter's.

The Covenant Service was within the Mass that morning and Father Peter talked in his sermon about the things which continue to divide us, suggesting the church was possibly one in Jesus' time as he quoted John 17:21 where Jesus prays that his disciples 'may be one. As you, Father are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us'. Being unable to receive communion as non-Roman Catholics and indeed unable to read the bible during the service made clear the division, but also seemed to strengthen our joint commitment and understanding.

It also made me mindful of potential division of the Church of England over the issue of the blessing of same sex marriages and our wider response to the LGBTQIA+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, questioning, intersex, or asexual) discussions that General Synod and others are having at present.

Personally. my beliefs and views on this have change significantly over the years, but I also respect that members of our congregations might be wrestling with this too.

My prayer is that this latest development will not further divide Christ's church, making unity even more distant.

As we say in our Communion service: Though we are many, we are one body because we all share in the one bread. May we resolve to maintain and improve that faith and commitment.

Resume of JC Lytham PCC Meeting held on 20 November 2023.

The PCC are keen for others to know what we are considering and discussing in our meetings. We are grateful that Paul Olive has offered to write articles about the meetings for the Magazine.

Discussions continued on the matters arising from the PCC and Leaders away day at Whalley Abbey last October. These centred on ways of growing our church congregation and suggestions included creating welcome packs; social events; involvement of our school in some church services; connections with teenagers; the condition and fitness for purpose of our buildings; support for the elderly and lonely people in our community and offering of further pray for those in need. All these matters are ongoing and will be monitored and revisited regularly over the coming months.

Detailed matters on the state of our three building were further discussed with particular reference to the lightening detectors, electricity supply and maintenance issues, repairs to the hall roof, removal of a tree at St John and upgrading telephone installations in each building.

Outreach and Discipleship was discussed, particularly Worship in Wellies, Christmas Through the Keyhole and Parenting take for Faith course, this latter initiative will be received in the new year as up has been low.

The Finance Committee presented a report on our parish finances with particular reference to outstanding parish share and our investments. It was agreed the Committee would bring to the next PCC meeting a clearer picture of our financial position. The safeguarding report was considered and there were no incidents to report. It was noted that Linda Hyland, our Safeguarding Officer, has completed her Leadership Course. PCC members have completed the Basic and Foundation courses. A policy concerning Ex-Offenders was accepted by the PCC

The school report (as included in the last magazine) was received with particular mention of potential admissions for September 2024.

The meeting closed with the Diocesan Vision Prayer.

What is the Parish Share

The Parish Share is a sum of money contributed by each Parish every year to the Diocese to support local ministry, in essence funding parish clergy stipends, pension contributions, housing costs, and training.

To a lesser extent it also contributes to a wide range of diocesan support services, including legal services, human resources advice, safeguarding and property management, though much of these costs are covered by the Church Commissioners. There is then also further support both centrally and from Parish Share for church schools, mission, discipleship, social outreach projects and support for parishes in deprived areas.

The Diocese of Blackburn is responsible for 211 parishes and 280 churches across most of Lancashire. The Parish Share Budget is in excess of £10m of which some 80% is represented by parochial staffing and related costs. The calculation of each church's parish share is somewhat complicated and takes into account attendance figures over the last three years, stipendiary costs, affluence of the parish population and a contribution to the most deprived parishes.

The figures for our combined churches are significant and, against a backcloth of the COVID pandemic where we experienced a substantial reduction in attendance, and a lack of resurgence in those numbers we have not been able to pay our Parish Share in full, despite attempts to increase giving by the introduction of the new Parish Giving Scheme.

Our total Parish Share outstanding as at 31st December 2023 was some £211,000, representing £84,000 for 2023 (after paying off some £42,000 during the year) and £127,000 for 2022. Going forward our Parish Share for the new financial year to 31st December 2024 will be £116,000.

We have both cash balances and investments totalling more than £200,000, though some of the investments are held on a restricted basis and obviously some of the cash resources are needed to meet day to day expenditure and fund our annual deficit. These figures are subject to final ratification / verification on the finalisation of our Annual Accounts to 31st December 2023, but they are a reasonably accurate representation of the situation.

At our PCC meeting held on 15th January it was agreed that this worrying financial position should be brought to the attention of our Diocese and to that end I have notified the Assistant Diocesan Secretary and the Archdeacon of Lancaster asking for a meeting to discuss a way forward. I will keep you informed of the outcomes.

Diocesan Vision Champions

Grateful thanks to both Liz Willis and Julie Webb, who have been the Vision Champions for St Cuthberts' for nine years, as they stand back from this role.

Liz and Julie feel the that now the time is right to hand on the baton. Some of the highlights from the last nine years would include the successful Harvest of Talents, which led to the Community Craft group forming; events supporting the Thy Kingdom Come initiative; promoting that the Diocesan Vision Prayer is said each week at our Communion Services and at PCC meetings and making sure the Diocesan Vision 2026 is promoted and developed in everything we do as a church.

As Emma now oversees our Mission, Outreach and Discipleship it feels that her role is a result of our working towards the Diocesan Vision.

Thank you, Liz and Julie, for everything you have done to encourage, motivate and help us to move forward in our vision. And not forgetting the passion and enthusiasm of Paula Chapman and the late Marion Smilie.

jeopardy of a last minute escape. The hyper-real psycho-drama of the wilderness. The promise of a glorious freedom. What more could you want? Well there's much more!'

The Churches in Lytham

The Churches in Lytham has agreed to meet more regularly to pray together and experience a taste of how each denomination worships. These commence at St John on Wednesday 21st February at 7:30pm. Everyone is welcome and we hope a number of you will come along as we host the first evening of prayer.

Feasting and Fasting

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, falls this year on 14 February, which is also St Valentine's Day. This is a fairly unusual coincidence because the fixed period of Lent runs right up to Easter, so its dates are determined by the date of Easter, which this year is 31 March. The calendar date of Easter is different each year because the Crucifixion and Resurrection took place at the time of the Jewish Passover, a feast whose date is set by the lunar calendar. Our familiar calendar, with its fixed dates, is a solar calendar. The cycles of the sun and the moon differ, so mapping the lunar cycle onto our solar calendar means that Easter, together with all liturgical feast-days and seasons linked to it, such as Lent and Pentecost, vary each year: they are 'movable feasts'. Saints' days, however, are dates within the solar calendar, just like Christmas Day and our own birthdays.

So how, this year, do we cope with these two feast-days being on one day, given that Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of a period of austerity and self-denial, while the modern world uses St Valentine's Day as an opportunity to encourage us to spend on flowers, chocolates, wine, various other gifts, and meals out – any or all of which we might be thinking of giving up for Lent. Slightly tongue in cheek, I suggest that there is a possible solution for anyone who wants to do both things. Following on from the Jewish practice of regarding a holy day, such as the Sabbath or Passover, as running from sunset on the previous day to sunset on the day itself, the Christian church has always allowed a feastday to be celebrated on the preceding evening, known as the vigil of the feast-day. So, St Valentine's Day could be celebrated, liturgically or indulgently, on the evening of 13 February. This year, that happens to be Shrove Tuesday when, ahead of the rigours of Lent, many societies let their hair down by celebrating carnival and eating the kind of food that then disappears from the diet. That's why, in this country, it is Pancake Day -- treat food and perhaps even some mad fun with pancake tossing and pancake races.

But even in Lent itself there are moments when we can ease back a little. Sundays are never fasting days. And the Fourth Sunday in Lent, also known as Mid-Lent Sunday, came to have a particular association with relaxing the penitential rigours of self-denial. In medieval times this 'day off' was known as Laetare Sunday because of the opening words of the Introit of the Latin Mass, 'Laetare Jerusalem', 'Rejoice, O Jerusalem...'. The Introit addressed the congregation as people who had been in sorrow, and urged them take consolation and enter God's house with rejoicing — a suitable theme for this special day, when everyone felt ready for a breather before facing up to the increased demands of Passiontide and Holy Week as the climax of Lent. Another common name for the day, especially after the Reformation had done away with the Latin liturgy, was Refreshment Sunday. Less common, but still quite well attested, is the name 'The Sunday of the Five Loaves' because the Gospel reading was the story of the Feeding of the Five Thousand. It carries appropriate resonance for a day that many people must have associated with food-treats! For us, Mid-Lent Sunday is also Mothering Sunday, this year 10 March, when mothers are given treats and often a celebratory meal. *Joyce Hill*
