Dear Friends,

For many years I have been interested in the Ministry of Healing and as I prepared a sermon a few weeks ago I was reminded that this is an area of ministry we have not been recognising as a parish for a few years.



As I prepared the sermon on Mark 1:21-28, reading how Jesus cured a man of an unclean spirit whilst he taught with such authority in the synagogue in Capernaum I was reminded how healing was as central to Jesus ministry as his speaking.

Time after time throughout the gospels, and especially in the Gospel of St Luke, we read how Jesus performed miracles, many of them restoring people to full health. Surely, if we are the body of Christ and are to witness for him in the world today, we too should be including and offering this ministry.

I firmly believe that God continues to heal people today, perhaps we hear less of miracles, but I for one can vouch for the miracle of healing brought about by the developments in healthcare coupled with the intercessions of others.

Our diocese is also supporting the ministry of healing, holding a 'Festival of Healing and Renewal' in Blackburn Cathedral on Saturday 12 October, from 9.30am to 4.30pm which I hope a number of us can attend.

Prior to 2020 we offered individual prayers for healing and the opportunity of anointing with holy oil alongside communion. The PCC have agreed we introduce this offer of ministry once again in both

churches. Initially this will be during our monthly Parish Communion services. Anyone wishing to receive this ministry will be invited to move to the chapel, having received their communion, where they will be quietly met with and supported with prayer and anointing.

I will be approaching a few people to assist in offering this prayerful support and as soon as we have a small team in place we will commence this ministry.

When I was undergoing my treatment and stem cell transplant I was very aware of and appreciative of so many peoples prayerful support. May I ask for similar prayerful support from you all for this ministry, even if you are not part of the frontline team.

Resume of JC Lytham PCC Meeting held in January 2024.

The PCC continued to discuss matters arising from the Away Day at Whalley Abbey, last autumn. It was noted as a result that a newly formed Social Committee was to hold its first meeting on 16 January 2024; a Welcome Pack for new Church members is being created; links with Lytham C of E Primary School were to be further strengthened; and possible developments to enhance our support for older people were discussed (with mention made in relation to the Anna Chaplaincy which is being introduced in the Diocese).

It was noted that Revd Anne Beverley was to stand down as Kirkham Area Dean in mid-February, taking on the role of Director of Ministry in the Diocese. Nick has had further discussions with her regarding possible funding for a Youth Worker.

Our Church buildings were discussed with reference to new electricity meters, lightning conductor testing, lighting repairs and the upgrade to an alarm system at St Cuthberts. Repairs to roofing, outside lighting and removal of tree debris/leaves at the rear of St Johns was also discussed. The PCC were pleased to hear that roof repairs to the Church Hall have been successfully concluded. The newly formed Building Committee will meet on 22 January 2024.

Emma updated the meeting on our Outreach and Discipleship, with particular reference to Worship in Wellies at school which has a committed group of supporters and Parenting in Faith which is to continue despite low numbers. Christmas Through the Keyhole was a great success being very much appreciated by both Lytham CofE and Hall Park schools. Emma considered that it would be worth running this again this Christmas, hopefully to a wider audience. The autumn Alpha course finished in December and although the number attending was

small, those attending were very positive, a further Alpha course has now started. The positive impact of these courses on people's lives makes their continuation very worthwhile.

The Finance Committee report was submitted by Wendy Riley, the PCC Treasurer, tabling current figures. Paul Olive further presented a resume of our outstanding Parish Share, which is significant, to that end it was agreed that we approach the Diocesan Board of Finance to discuss a way forward. It was also agreed that an article should be included in the Parish Magazine outlining the whole background to Parish Share and the amounts outstanding. Paul agreed to draft this. *(Now completed and in the February magazine).*

Linda Hyland presented her Safeguarding Report, there were no incidents to report. All PCC members are now asked to complete the Domestic Abuse Course and also let Linda have their copy Certificates when they complete any training.

The School Report was received and it was noted that interviews for the Deputy Head position were to be held in early February.

Sunday School had a good run up to Christmas with the Crib Service at St Cuthbert was once again very popular.

The Deanery Synod Meeting held on 8 December 2023 was addressed by Bishop Philip. He made particular reference about the "tough times" being experienced by the Church and that we must all keep our faith, develop more leaders, keep justice as a high priority and keep encouraging young people in their understanding of the Christian Faith. In addition reference was made to the application for substantial funding being made by the diocese to support work in deprived areas and with children and youth people.

As the meeting closed Nick made reference to the Covenant Service at St Peters Roman Catholic Church on 21 January 2024 at 10.30 for The Churches in Lytham.

The meeting closed with the Diocesan Vision Prayer at 8.50pm.

Safeguarding

Our Church is committed to safeguarding as an integral part of our ministry and mission, promoting a safer culture and the welfare of every child, young person and adult. In our January magazine we noted that Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Would you be able to recognise abuse? First we need to understand what abuse is.

Abuse is when someone causes us harm or distress. It can take many forms, including physical, sexual, emotional, financial, institutional, discrimination. It can occur in someone's home, a care home, a hospital, a church or any public place. An abuser isn't necessarily a stranger, it might be a family member, friend, carer or anyone. Sometimes abuse is not intentional but happens because someone does not have the skills or support needed to care for someone. That does not make the impact of it any less, but it can help to understand how it happened.

Anyone can become a victim of abuse – it is no reflection of intelligence, strength or worth. However, people with care and support needs, such as older people or people with disabilities, are more likely to be abused or neglected. They may be seen as an easy target and may be less likely to identify abuse themselves or report it. Sometimes people may not even be aware that they are being abused. Abusers may try to prevent access to the person they abuse.

It can be very hard for people to speak out about abuse. Often because of fear that there may be negative consequences if they tell anyone what's happening to them. Some people may delay telling someone about abuse for a long time, while others never tell anyone, even if they want to.

It's vital that people are able to speak out and that whoever they tell takes them seriously and acts on what they've been told.

The Historical Context of the Crucifixion

Our worship and reflection on Good Friday focus on Jesus's suffering on the cross: the crucifixion as the supreme sacrifice and means of redemption. But the gospels also tell us in detail about his capture, his appearance before the Jewish Sanhedrin, and the appeal to Roman authority for the death penalty. It's a familiar story. But if we set these events in the larger context of the history of the region, the narrative sharpens as a revealing account of occupation politics.

Occupied Judaea was a subsidiary part of the Roman province of Syria. It was administered by Pontius Pilate, a man of middle rank, holding authority under the Governor of Syria, who controlled the area's legions. Pilate's role, as procurator, an administrative functionary, was to keep order and collect taxes. Romans, chiefly interested in reaping the economic benefits of occupation and maintaining imperial order, often tolerated local customs. So, in Judaea they allowed the Jews to practise their religion and to keep their own religious court. But the Romans reserved for themselves the right of capital punishment and, just as they did elsewhere, they made use of carefully chosen collaborators. That was how the kingly family of the Herods came to power: they were outsiders from Idumea, who were put on the throne by the Romans. The same applied to the Jewish High Priests: they were also Roman appointees.

With this context in mind, we can see more clearly how things played out. The Sanhedrin, the Jewish religious court headed by the High Priest, had religious objections to Jesus' teaching and especially his claim to be the Messiah. But in order to have him killed, they had to get the Romans on board. So, recognising that an argument about

Messiahship would have been dismissed as an entirely Jewish matter, the case they presented to Pilate was that Jesus claimed to be King of the Jews. As collaborators, who needed Pilate on their side as much as he needed them on his, they would have shared an awareness that a claim to kingship was a potential threat to the structures of occupation that the Romans had put in place through their appointees, and also a possible rallying point for rebellion. Pilate was not convinced of Jesus' guilt, and would anyway have seen him as a highly improbable candidate for crucifixion since this was a means of death normally reserved for common criminals and slaves. However, it was also sometimes used for traitors, so when Pilate gave in, he covered his own back by insisting that a board describing Jesus as King of the Jews be fixed to the cross: a crucifixion by someone of his middling rank had to be justifiable to his superiors, so it was expedient to make sure that Jesus was presented as a traitor in Roman terms. We should also remember that this was a volatile situation. Pilate, normally based at the then Roman headquarters in Caesarea, was only in Jerusalem to see that things did not get out of hand during the Passover, when feelings ran high and the Romans feared riots. Yet, as a mere procurator, he had no significant body of soldiers under his command. Exposed as he was, and faced with a crowd demanding crucifixion, fear must have been a considerable factor.

Events were driven by self-interest and political manoeuvring, with justice and morality undermined by the corrupting demands of occupation and collaboration. Such are the human failings at the heart of the crucifixion narrative.

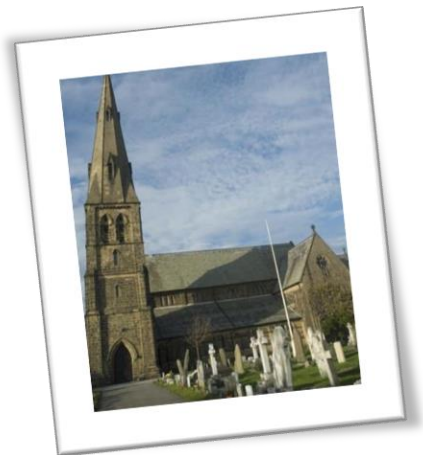

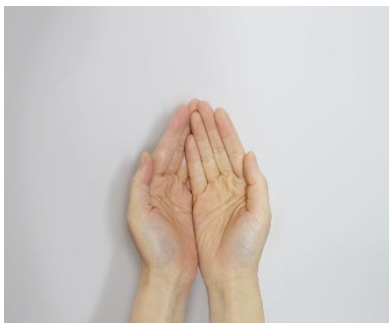

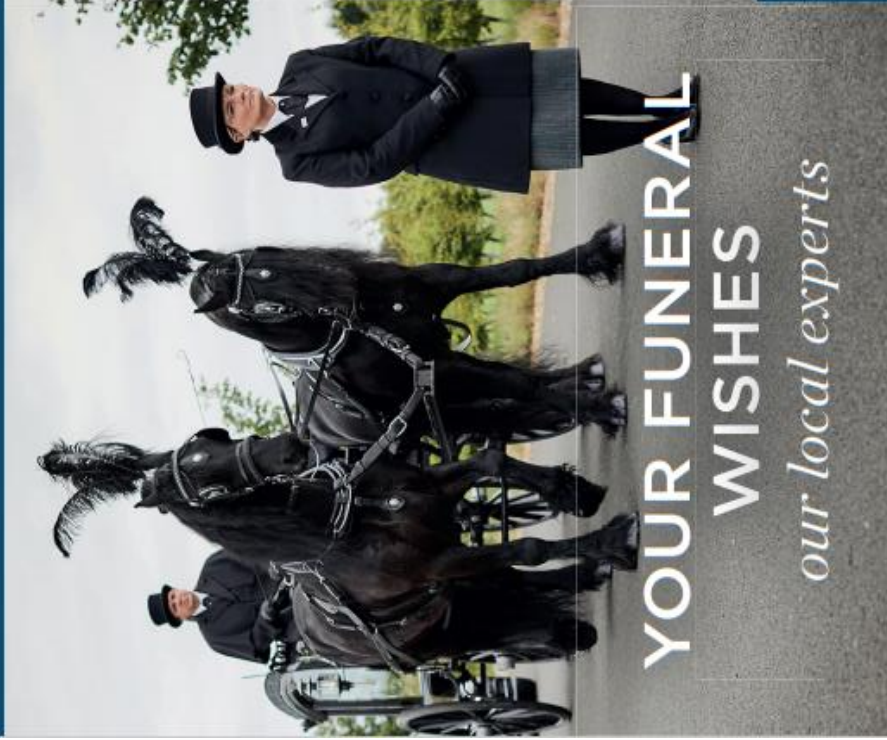
