Dear Friends

With our Annual Parochial Church Meeting coming up on Monday 18th May I thought I would share with you the aims the PCC have set for this year. They are varied and aspirational, but our underlying desire is for people in Lytham to come to know Jesus personally.



Some of our priorities are:

to continue to engage fully with the Diocesan Renewal Programme, including running a Mission Weekend in September coinciding with celebrating the 175th Anniversary of the opening of St John's;

to bring baptisms into our main services with a Zoom meeting with baptism families beforehand to help them consider more fully what baptism means.

to provide ample opportunities for Bible Study, and help our parishioners to gain confidence in telling their faith stories.

to encourage new leaders and volunteers especially supporting anyone one who wishes to explore lay or ordained ministry and help to connect them with the appropriate people in the diocese.

to extend connections between the school and the church, embed our All Age Service and invite BLAST and others to take part in planning and leading some services.

to progress repairs and improvements to our buildings as outlined in the Quinquennial Survey Reports completed in the autumn of 2024, including installing a new electronic organ and completing a faculty application for creating a toilet and improve the kitchen at St John and completing the faculty application to remove the screen at the east end of the St Aidan's Chapel and to open up the choir and clergy vestries at St Cuthbert's.

As you can see there is much to work on, both spiritually and practically, and we are looking for people to assist in various aspects of this vision. By working together I am sure we can bring many of these things to fruition, helping ensure our Christian presence in Lytham into future generations.



The Visitation

The last day of this month is a red-letter day in the calendar of *Common Worship*, denoting that it is major festival, just one level down from the principal feast-days of the church, such as Easter or Ascension, also printed in red but in bold type for further prominence. What we celebrate on 31 May is the Visit of the Virgin Mary to her cousin Elizabeth, an event described only in Luke's gospel, chap. 1, vv.39-45. In the preceding verses we hear of Gabriel's visit to Mary, telling her that, through the Holy Spirit, she would give birth to a son, who would be called Jesus, and that her cousin Elizabeth, through the power of God and against all normal expectation, had conceived a son and was already six months pregnant. Mary immediately sets off to visit Elizabeth who, inspired by the Holy Spirit, greets her as 'the mother of my Lord'. In response, Mary voices the hymn of praise which we know as the *Magnificat*.

The Feast of the Visitation is quite a late addition to the church calendar. It was first instituted by the Franciscans in 1263, after which it spread quite quickly throughout the western church, although it was celebrated on different dates in different places. Just over a century later, Pope Urban VI decided that it should be properly adopted by church as a whole, but it was his successor, Boniface IX, who finally proclaimed it in 1389. The date then universally adopted was 2 July, probably because it was already quite widely used.

At the time of the Reformation, the Church of England's new Book of Common Prayer dropped most of the feast-days of the Roman church. But when the BCP was re-issued in 1662, some of the old feast-days were reintroduced and the Feast of the Visitation was one

of them, to be celebrated, as in the Roman tradition, on 2 July. It was an acceptable feast-day because it was the celebration of a biblical event, which was what the BCP favoured in augmenting its originally very austere and pared-down calendar.

The Roman Catholic calendar was revised in 1969, and the Feast of the Visitation was reassigned to 31 May because it harmonised better with the sequence of events in the gospel story. As already noted, Gabriel had told Mary that Elizabeth was six months pregnant, so the birth of her son — John the Baptist — occurred six months before the birth of Jesus. After the fourth century, when the feast-day of Jesus's birth came to be celebrated on 25 December, the birth of John was commemorated in the liturgical calendar six months earlier, on 24 June. This meant that, when the feast-day of the Visitation officially entered the calendar on 2 July, this was narratively rather awkward: the Visitation was being celebrated a matter of days after the prominent feast-day of John's birth. So, with the revision of the calendar in 1969, 31 May was chosen instead. It has the merit of preceding the feast-day of John's birth and is not far outside the period of six months before the Jesus's Nativity on 25 December, although why 31 May was the particular date chosen, I have not been able to find out. Perhaps someone can tell me. The Calendar of Common Worship uses this new date, as do some other churches, but there is a note in Common Worship that the feast may be celebrated on 2 July instead. Joyce Hill
