Dear Friends

During the past year we have been a part of the Diocesan Renewal Programme; this has informed the PCC agenda and led to some good discussions. A main aim of the programme is to embed the principles of Leading Your Church into Growth (LYCiG) into the day to day life of the parish.



I first attended a LYCiG conference in about 2001, and this is the third time I have engaged with it. The difference this time is that whole of the parish, especially the PCC, is encouraged and assisted to engage with it through support from the Diocesan Renewal Team. Our PCC has gone through the programme over the past year and will be revisiting it again during 2026 to help us clarify and develop a clear vision under God for the future growth of JC Lytham.

The programme included our Anchored in Faith mission, and as the Blackburn Diocese celebrates its centenary in 2026 one of the aims is for every parish in the diocese to hold a mission in the autumn. We are anticipating this being over the first weekend in October, linking it with our Harvest Festival.

One of the things the programme has highlighted for me is that we must always be prepared, and brave enough, to talk about our faith in Jesus when opportunities arise. That is true in our personal lives, but also as a church. When we arrange an event and invite people along, we must make sure we tell them something about Jesus. Often in my ministry I have sought to be a Christian presence where ever I am, but not necessarily spoken directly about Jesus.

As we approach Christmas this year we need to remind ourselves

On Saturday 6th December, we will be opening the trail to the community, 10-12:30. Parents,



The season of Advent is observed during the four weeks leading up to Christmas. It marks the beginning of the liturgical year and a time for spiritual reflection and anticipation. The word *Advent* is derived from the Latin *adventus* meaning *coming* or *arrival*, signifying both the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ and the hopeful expectation of his promised return. It is this dual nature which allows Advent to incorporate remembrance and anticipation.

It is a season steeped in symbolism and tradition. A common practice is the lighting of an Advent wreath which features four candles [fork 'andles?] representing hope, peace, joy and love. The lighting of an additional candle each week gradually illuminates the path towards

Christ as the Light of the World. A fifth candle, lit on Christmas Day, signifies the fulfilment of God's promise: Emmanuel, 'God with us.'

Advent is much more than a countdown to Christmas. It is a call to prepare our hearts and to consider again the mystery of the Incarnation – God becoming human – and to embrace its transformative hope. Advent, then, allows for a time to step back from distractions and focus on the eternal truths of faith. Worship, prayer and acts of kindness should encourage a deeper connection with God and fellow humans.





St John's Bells Project Update

The bells at St. John's are continuing to get more difficult to handle so it is unsure how much longer we will be able to ring them for. It is already very difficult to ring a Quarter Peel on them and we may not do another until the bell frame has been replaced and the bells refurbished. Hopefully we will still be able to do the planned ringing for Christmas and New Year.

The faculty needed to allow the bell frame replacement work to go ahead has been fully approved. This is another major step on the way to achieving the refurbishment and continued life of St. John's bells.

Fundraising is going well. It's only been just over three months since we started fundraising in earnest so we are very pleased with the progress so far.

The Rev. Nick has co-opted me onto the PCC and so far I have attended two PCC meetings, the last one being on November 17th. The aim is to enhance good communication and partnering between the church trustees and the ringers and so far this is working very well.

I give the PCC regular updates on the progress of fundraising and engage them in any fundraising event proposals. The PCC is responsible for maintaining the churches and obtaining the faculties as and when required so the better the relationship is between ringers and church the smoother things progress.

On Friday, November 14th a quarter peal (QP) was rung at St. Cuthbert's. There were eight ringers from St. Peter's, St Joseph's and St. John's bands. They rang Grandsire Doubles with three covers. The QP went very well, was well struck and was the first QP for one of our

distribution. Stephen was one of these: his Greek name suggests that he was himself a member of the Hellenistic community. The seven were then blessed by the Apostles in an act that later came to be understood as ordaining them as deacons, and so they began their work. Stephen is singled out as being a miracle-worker, full of faith and inspired by the Holy Spirit. But there were members of certain synagogues who challenged Stephen's new Christian teaching. When it proved impossible to defeat him in debate, they orchestrated more hostility against him, made use of false testimony, and had him seized and brought before the Sanhedrin on a charge of blasphemy against Moses.

Most of Acts chapter 7 is taken up with Stephen's defence, strongly supporting the ministry of Jesus as a fulfilment of Jewish history and teaching, not a destruction of it. He concludes with a rousing condemnation of the Jews for resisting the Holy Spirit in a manner he describes as 'stiff-necked'. This angered the crowd even more, and so they took him outside the city and stoned him to death, with Stephen committing himself to God as he died, and begging God to forgive them for what they were doing. A young man, by the name of Saul, stood and watched, looking after the cloaks of those doing the stoning. At the time, he was a vigorous persecutor of those who followed the new faith. But he later underwent a dramatic conversion and, as Paul, became one of the great leaders of the early church.

new ringers, Andy Wiseman. The QP comprised 1,320 changes and took 53 minutes. It was rung in celebration of our King's 77th birthday and it was also a sponsored event aimed at raising funds to help pay for a replacement bell frame at St. John's in Lytham.

The event was also a bit of an open day with free refreshments and tours of the bell tower. It was a very successful day and raised over £2,500. The 'Sum-up' machine for collecting card donations at the back of St. Cuthbert's church has been set up with an option to donate directly to the bell fund and there have been a few donations, I'm not sure exactly how much at the moment, the PCC treasurer will let me know.

Our JustGiving page has also received another £1,750 in the last week alone which also qualifies for gift aid. Applications for funds for St John's bells had now been made to 28 separate organisations. We didn't expect positive responses from all agencies and, so far, seven organisations have responded to say they can't support our project. On the positive side a total of £25,500 has been pledged so far by three organisations and we are optimistic that we will get more soon as other applications go through the various vetting processes, some of which are quite rigorous.

Adding together the pledged funds, the potential gift aid amounts and the actual cash in the bank the total amount we have so far is just under £40,000.

One of our ringers, Paul Hart, is particularly good at woodwork and he has completed the construction of two "Bellometers". He has placed one in each of our churches. These will be updated as and when the fund increases to show a running total of funds raised. Our initial target is £91,102. If we can raise £100,000, we will be able to afford

to upgrade the planned steel frame with a more weather resistant and durable frame which has cast iron sides. The additional cost of which is £9,412. We are planning to enact a few cost saving activities to reduce the final cost from Taylors, namely: Provide Local Labour - Saving, £7,121. Locally provided accommodation - Saving, £3,960. Local removal of small items - Saving, £430. This will bring the total cost to £79,591. Adding the cast iron upgrade will bring the cost back up to £89,000. We are also hoping to be able to reclaim the vat which will be around £15,000 to £20,000. However, we actually have to pay the vat in the first place before we can claim it back and will have to see if we still have that eligibility post budget.

We are hoping to raise enough funds to get the refurbishment work started early in the second quarter of next year.

In other news, during the practice at St. John's on Tuesday November 4th a loud bang was heard from the belfry. On investigation it was discovered that the clapper had become detached from the number two bell! Lucky there was no damage done. The bolt which attaches the clapper to the staple inside the bell had come out of position thus releasing the clapper during ringing. Mick and Neil were able to fit a new bolt prior to Remembrance Sunday to enable all six bells to be rung for the service.

Further inspection revealed that three of the bells need attention as the staple bolts are loose and need new leather washers fitting and retightening.

The stay on the tenor at St. Cuthbert's is also in need of attention.

Mick and Neil are planning a maintenance day in the next week or so to address all these minor issues.

The Feast of Stephen

The title of this month's article, as I'm sure everyone will recognise, is from the opening of a popular Christmas carol: Good King Wenceslas looked out on the Feast of Stephen. Wenceslas was Prince and Duke of Bohemia from 931 to probably 935, when he was assassinated by his younger brother. Almost immediately he was held up as a heroic ruler of great virtue, whose death was regarded as a martyrdom. The story familiar to us captures his determination, piety, kindness and generosity. It has its origins in the words of the chronicler Cosmas of Prague who, in c. 1119, wrote, 'no one doubts that, rising every night from this noble bed, with bare feet and only one chamberlain, he went around to God's churches and gave alms generously to widows, orphans, those in prison and afflicted by every difficulty, so much so that he was considered, not a prince, but the father of all the wretched'. The words of the carol were published by an American, John Mason Neale, in 1853. It's wholly imaginative, but its vivid details capture the essence of Wenceslas's virtue as a ruler, for which he is venerated in the Czech Republic.

Mason's poem presents a scene that takes place in the depths of winter, 'on the feast of Stephen', celebrated on 26 December. Stephen is the church's protomartyr, or first martyr (Greek $\pi\rho\tilde{\omega}\tau$ o ς , $pr\acute{o}tos$, 'first'). Our only information about him is in the Acts of the Apostles, chapters 6-8. There we learn that Hellenistic (Greekspeaking) Jews who were following the new teachings of Christ began to grumble that the widows of their community were doing less well from the daily distribution of food than those of the Hebraic Jews. So the twelve Apostles proposed that the growing number of those who were busy with this distribution should appoint seven men 'full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom' who could be relied upon to oversee fair
